

## **EPA CHANGES**

The Environmental Protection Agency on Friday set strict emissions standards for heavy-duty trucks covering model years 2027 through 2032. The new rules are somewhat stricter than those proposed last year. For example, motor carriers will have more time (2027-2030) to build out a zero-emissions infrastructure, but the flip side is stronger emissions limits in 2031 and 2032. The proposed rule, by 2032, sought to get 50% of vocational vehicles like buses and waste haulers to zero emissions; 35% of new short-haul regional tractors; and 25% of new long-haul trucks – figures that called for more than 40% of all heavy-duty trucks to be zero emissions for trucks in the six model years. Under the 1,155-page final rule, roughly 30% of heavy-heavy-duty vocational trucks would need to be zero-emission by 2032 and 40% of regional day cabs.

"Given the wide range of operations required of our industry to keep the economy running, a successful emission regulation must be technology neutral and cannot be one-size-fits-all," said American Trucking Associations (ATA) President and CEO Chris Spear, adding ATA opposes the rule in its current form because the post-2030 targets remain "entirely unachievable given the current state of zero-emission technology, the lack of charging infrastructure and restrictions on the power grid. Any regulation that fails to account for the operational realities of trucking will set the industry and America's supply chain up for failure." The costs are in the trillions of dollars to set the infrastructure, with a mere return of less than 2%, totally unattainable.

Yet this administration seems dead set on regulating every local mom and pop business out of existence with its flurry of unworkable environmental mandates," he added. "This administration appears more focused on placating extreme environmental activists who have never been inside a truck than the small business truckers who ensure that Americans have food in their grocery stores and clothes on their backs. If you bought it, a trucker brought it." It appears this Administration is delusional in many areas.

## **NAVIGATING CONSTRUCTION**

As the spring blooms and the roads awaken from winter's slumber, so does construction season. For truckers, this means adapting to new challenges on the roads. Here are some essential tips to ensure a safe journey through construction zones:

- 1. Stay Updated -Construction zones are constantly evolving. Stay informed about roadwork and detours by checking traffic apps, local news updates, or your GPS system. Plan your route accordingly to avoid surprises.
- 2. Slow Down Reduced speed limits in construction zones are not just suggestions; they are crucial for safety. Be prepared to slow down and follow posted speed limits. Lower speeds give you more time to react to changing conditions.
- 3. Maintain a Safe Following Distance Construction zones often mean sudden stops or slow-moving traffic. Keep a safe distance between your truck and the vehicle in front of you. The general rule is the "3-second rule": Pick a fixed point, like a sign, and when the vehicle ahead passes it, count "one-thousand-one, one-thousand-two, one-thousand-three." You shouldn't reach that point before you finish counting to three.
- 4. Watch for Workers Construction zones are bustling with activity. Stay vigilant for construction workers and their equipment. Obey all flaggers and road signs indicating their presence. Their safety, and yours, depends on it.
- 5. Use Your Signals Indicate your intentions early and clearly. Use your turn signals and hazard lights as needed to communicate with other

drivers. This is especially crucial when merging or changing lanes in construction zones.

- 6. **Be Patient** Delays are common in construction zones, and frustration can lead to risky driving behavior. Remember, your safety and the safety of others is the priority. Take deep breaths, listen to some calming music, and practice patience.
- 7. Expect the Unexpected Construction zones can have uneven pavement, lane shifts, or sudden closures. Always be prepared for unexpected changes. Scan the road ahead and stay alert to any upcoming challenges.
- 8. Plan for Rest Stops Construction zones can add time to your journey. Factor in extra time for potential delays and plan your rest stops accordingly.
- 9. Communicate with Dispatch Keep your dispatch informed about any construction-related delays. They can help adjust your schedule and provide support if needed.
