May Roadcheck 13th – 15th

The Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance has announced the dates for this year's International Roadcheck. The annual three-day "high-visibility, high-volume commercial motor vehicle inspection and regulatory compliance enforcement" is scheduled for **May 13-15**. This means **extra inspections**. This year's Roadcheck has two areas of emphasis:

- **Tires:** Inspectors will scrutinize tires for **tread depth and proper inflation**, and look for damage such as audible air leaks, tread separation, cuts, bulges and improper repairs.
- Records-of-duty status (RODS): Hours-of-service regulations are designed to prevent driver fatigue and enhance road safety. Inspectors will be on high alert for any discrepancies in RODS, including electronic logging device tampering, improper use of driving categories and false codriver claims. Your pre and post trips must be on duty. Your time fueling must be on duty.

Penske Trucks

Reminders: When bringing trucks to Penske for service, please **go to the kiosk** and enter the information requested. It is important that you give Penske the proper information regarding repairs so that those repairs can be completed in a timely manner. Failure to follow this procedure will result in the truck not being properly repaired to your satisfaction. They can only fix what they are aware of, so no matter how small the details are, please let them know.

Spring

As we move into May (Spring) it may be time to do some spring house cleaning. This may be the time to get the winter clothing out of the truck and **de-clutter** a bit. You might even find some things you have misplaced and were looking for. If you have the truck at home, get your winter clothes out, and clean, ready for next year. As we move into the spring, begin to **watch for animals** on the move at night, along with the ever-present tourist who will start to meander onto our roadways, presenting challenges along the way.

In the meantime, it's more important than ever to communicate clearly with dispatch about any mechanical issues you notice. Don't assume someone else has reported it—if you see something, say something. Put it on your DVIR.

Also, if you're heading to **Perham or International Falls**, be sure to **check with dispatch ahead of time** to see if your **truck or trailer is due for service**. These are great opportunities to take care of routine maintenance and prevent problems before they start.

Keeping equipment in top shape is a team effort—your eyes and reports help us stay safe, legal, and efficient.

Seals

That said, we can only do so much from the office – **you are our eyes on the ground!** A thorough **daily tire inspection** is essential. Check every tire's **tread depth and pressure.** The time you spend on prevention can save **hours of downtime** and **hundreds of dollars** in unnecessary roadside service costs—especially after hours.

While checking the seal, ensure the doors are latched properly. If they are not, go to the shipping office rather than risk rain and a subsequent claim for damage to freight.

A stocked tire swap is always cheaper than an emergency call. Stay proactive and help keep yourself—and the fleet—rolling safely and efficiently!

A few extra seconds of caution can prevent **thousands of dollars in damage** and keep everyone safe. Let's all stay sharp out there.

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Seal Integrity Matters – Check and Report!

Trailer seals are a critical part of protecting both the **security of the load** and the **reputation of our company**. Every time you pick up or deliver a load, it's important to make sure the **seal is intact and matches the paperwork**.

If you notice a **broken**, **missing**, **or tampered seal**, **contact the office immediately–before proceeding**. This helps us protect the load, report it correctly, and avoid potential claims or delays.

Broken seals can raise red flags with shippers, receivers, and inspectors. Taking a few seconds to check and report ensures we stay compliant, accountable, and professional.

Always double-check the seal and make it a habit—it's a small step with big impact.

Protect Your Windshield – Leave Space

Windshield damage is more than just a nuisance—it can be expensive and dangerous. One of the easiest ways to prevent cracks and chips is by **leaving plenty of space between you and the vehicle in front of you**, especially behind other trucks or construction vehicles.

Gravel, debris, and loose materials can fly up quickly, and the closer you are, the more likely they are to hit your glass. Even a small chip can spread into a full crack over time, leading to costly repairs or replacement.

Give yourself a cushion. It helps with visibility, safety, and keeps your windshield intact. Prevention is always cheaper than repair!
